INTRODUCTION

Pursuing a theological education is an amazing adventure. Continuing your studies beyond college is a big step in itself. But education for ministry in a seminary, divinity school or school of theology involves more than shaping the way you think; you will be intellectually challenged, but also practically prepared and faithfully formed for a lifetime of service.

As an undergraduate, you may or may not have majored in religion, but if you are reading this book, somewhere along the way you decided that you wanted to explore ministry—whether in a congregation, on a college campus, as a counselor, in social service or in the mission field. Or perhaps you want to get a doctorate so you can teach in a college or seminary like the professors who influenced you. Whether you yet know where or how you will serve, you have felt a pull—a calling—to explore further education.

In reality, most people don't know a lot about graduate theological studies. That is why we created The FTE Guide to Theological Education. We hope this resource will give you a broad picture of theological education and help you find a school that is right for you. Within this guide you will find information about degree programs, differences among schools and financial aid—all designed to help you in making your decision. If you think you want to go to seminary, this guide is intended to help you decide what you are looking for and where to find it.

Why Attend a Theological School?

Students are attracted to theological schools for a variety of reasons. Most theological students have an interest in some form of ministry. This might mean a professional and/or ordained calling to work in a parish setting. Other students attend these schools to prepare for work in church-related organizations that specialize in social service, missionary work, or ministry to particular populations. Still other students are interested in theological scholarship—pursuing doctoral work that will prepare them for teaching and leadership roles in the academy. Finally, there are students attending theological schools to be formed in a distinctly Christian setting in order to extend their witness in their non-theological vocations. With all these differences in mind, remember that there is no “typical” theological student, no mold from which one must be cast in order to find the right place in theological education.

Regardless of the specific path, most people choose to enter seminary because of a sense of calling. For some, this call emerges from a deep relationship with God, through prayer, a spiritual practice or some other spiritual discipline. Sometimes this calling is expressed in community, with a congregation, pastor, mentor or friend “calling out” a person's specific gifts for ministry. Sometimes the call is not to an end, but to the process of knowing God more deeply through the study of theology. Regardless of place and time, a vocational calling should be one that reflects one's own passion, motivated by a real desire to engage in the complexities of a theological vocation, and to extend that passion into the world in transformative ways on behalf of the body of Christ.

What is Theological Education?

In popular usage, the term usually refers to the education people receive in preparation for the job of being a minister. Theological education takes place in many different settings across this country and the world. An increasing number of denominations offer a formal program of theological education and certification. Other institutions and church groups provide training for pastors without college or seminary degrees who are already leading congregations. Some denominational bodies have created a course of study for persons who cannot pursue formal schooling but seek to serve churches in their communities. The FTE Guide does not attempt to catalogue the educational alternatives to the traditional post-baccalaureate degree path. Here, we focus, instead, on theological education for the Master of Divinity offered by institutions accredited by The Association of Theological Schools Commission on Accrediting.

Theological education is much more than graduate school. A theological school is an institution of advanced intellectual inquiry, a graduate school of the humanities that often depends on the traditions of the age-old academy. Faculty at the schools usually research and publish in their fields and belong to academic guilds. Academic disciplines such as biblical studies, philosophy, languages, ethics, history, and, of course, theology, have deep roots in Western academic tradition. From this perspective, theological schools might look like traditional graduate programs in the humanities, similar to programs in literature or history or philosophy.

However, these institutions are also professional schools that teach students practical skills for their work in church and society. They offer courses and degrees in areas such as counseling, homiletics (preaching), Christian and religious education, and leadership—fields that require both an intellectual grounding as well as specific skills. The term “practical theology” usually encompasses these disciplines. In this way, theological schools may resemble other professional programs, like business schools, law schools or schools of social work.

Finally, there is the distinctly religious dimension of theological education. Every theological school has a unique religious history, rooted in the commitments of a distinct faith tradition or religious movement. Even different seminaries of the same denomination or tradition will vary widely in their commitments. Moreover, each theological school will foster its own religious community, a unique congregation of believers—and skeptics—who come together as future ministers and social workers and teachers in a communion unlike anything they will experience again.

So as you begin to explore theological education, you are entering a truly unique world that draws from various elements to create its own distinctive culture. While some of your knowledge and wisdom about choosing an undergraduate school might apply to theological education, some facets of theological schools may be confusing. The FTE Guide is designed to help you clarify your questions and address your uncertainty, as well as give you confidence in the process of choosing a theological school.

Theological Degrees

When looking at theological schools, you will quickly notice that there are a lot of different degrees with different names. They may or may not make sense to you. While there are a few basic degrees, some schools name them differently based on their own traditions and histories.

Master of Divinity (M.Div.)

The primary degree offered in theological schools is the Master of Divinity (M.Div.), which can also be called the Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.) or Master of Ministry (M.Min.). Students in these degree programs comprise about 42 percent of the total population of theological students enrolled in institutions accredited by the Association for Theological Schools (ATS).

The M.Div. is the basic degree for parish and ordained ministry. According to ATS, degrees for ministerial formation should enable students to develop in four primary areas:

1. Comprehensive and critical understandings of the faith community;
2. Awareness of the cultural and social realities in which ministry occurs, including the faith community itself;
3. Emotional, spiritual, intellectual and social formation for the practice of ministry; and
4. Capacity to enter and effectively practice a specific form of ministry.

Ideally, these four areas should be integrated into the curriculum and community life of the theological school. In reality, however, sometimes institutions excel in some areas and lag in others. For example, the delivery of theological content in the academic disciplines (such as theology and history) may be superior while the development of practical skills necessary to be effective in ministry (such as leadership and financial management) receives less attention or vice versa.

In most cases, the M.Div. takes three years to complete as a full-time student, though some schools have extended the requirements and therefore the time it takes to complete the degree. Generally, M.Div. students must complete a broad range of classes, ranging from the classical disciplines of theology, biblical studies, ethics and history, to courses in the arts of ministry, such as counseling, homiletics (preaching), liturgics (worship) and education. Students who plan to be ordained will also take courses required by their denomination such as church polity, church administration or denominational history. Such ordination requirements are typically in addition to the mandatory courses for the M.Div. degree.

These degrees also require field education in a ministerial setting that exposes the student to the daily experience of ministry. Field education requirements are often completed in a parish, though some schools offer field education in other ministerial contexts such as hospitals, nursing homes, prisons and social service agencies. Most M.Div. programs require students to reflect systematically on their field education experience in writing and small group work, thereby allowing students to share their experiences with other future ministers.

Though the M.Div. is usually a highly structured degree with few electives, many schools offer the opportunity for students to customize their M.Div. programs with certain specialties or emphases. These programs often focus on particular forms of ministry (urban, youth, multicultural, missions, peace and justice) or practical ministerial skills (counseling, education, preaching, music, worship). In searching for an M.Div. degree, you should consider whether you would most benefit from a particular emphasis area or a general approach to the degree.

Specialized Ministerial Degrees

Most schools offer degrees other than the M.Div. to prepare for ministry in specific areas of pastoral skills. These degrees often have fewer course requirements and take less time to complete. In some denominations and traditions, these degrees will suffice for credentialing purposes, though they don't offer the same comprehensive preparation as the M.Div. Some of these programs focus generally on "Christian Ministries," "Christian Leadership," and "Pastoral Ministry." Others are more focused on specific fields such as counseling, Christian/religious education, missions, spiritual formation, sacred music and liturgics/worship. Since these degrees generally develop out of a particular interest or commitment of each school, there is great variety in how they are named and structured. In general, these programs usually take two years to complete and are sometimes offered in a certificate format (with even fewer requirements).

Joint and Dual Degrees

Many theological schools also offer joint degree programs so that students can work simultaneously toward two master's degrees at once. A common degree combination is the M.Div. and Master of Social Work (M.S.W.), which is usually offered at university-related theological schools. The M.Div./M.S.W. prepares future ministers for work specifically in social service settings, which often require a specialized skill set not taught in theological school. Other joint degree programs have also been developed over the years, allowing students to augment their theological training with a non-theological discipline. Some schools have even developed flexible dual degree programs in the universities to which they are related, allowing students to combine a theological degree with almost any other degree offered in the university (such as law, music or medicine). While dual degree programs require additional time to complete, they offer the student an uncommon breadth for their life and work.

Degrees for Teaching and Research

Not all students at theological schools are preparing for professional ministry. Many schools offer degrees that orient students generally toward theological study or prepare them for advanced work in research and teaching. These degrees carry titles such as "Master of Arts in Theological Studies," "Master of Theological Studies" and "Master of Arts in Religion" though their names vary depending on the context in which they were developed.

Generally, these degrees are taken in preparation for advanced programs in the theological disciplines, such as the Ph.D. or Th.D. Students in these master's programs are often interested primarily in teaching and research. Therefore, these degrees usually specialize in a particular area while also exposing the student broadly to the academic study of theology and/or religion. While many of the degrees allow the student to specialize in "classical disciplines" (such as theology, ethics or history), some schools offer these degree formats for the practical disciplines (such as counseling and education).

Programs for Spiritual Growth and Formation

Some schools also offer degree programs for individuals seeking an introduction to theological thinking and reflection primarily for personal spiritual growth. These students may be seeking an experience to enhance their faith or perhaps to augment their non-theological vocation with a theological perspective. These degrees are also named in a variety of ways, and students interested in this approach to theological education usually are not planning to pursue professional teaching or research.

Doctoral Degrees

Many schools offer advanced theological degrees beyond the master's degree level. Even though fewer than five percent of students at theological educational institutions are enrolled in advanced degree programs, their presence in an institution can be significant.

The most common advanced ministerial degree is the Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.). This degree is designed for students with the M.Div. who wish to further hone a particular skill or approach to ministry. Some schools offer a continuous M.Div.-to-D.Min. program wherein students can complete both degrees in a four- or five-year time span. Most D.Min. formats, however, require students to have extensive practical experience in a ministry setting before starting the program. Regardless, the D.Min. offers advanced skills and perspectives to ministers and can be a useful credential for denominational leadership at the regional and national levels.

Theological schools can also offer the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) and Doctor of Theology (Th.D.) degrees in a variety of fields. These degrees are primarily designed for students with interests in research, teaching or other endeavors in higher education. At university-related institutions, the Ph.D. may be offered through the graduate school rather than the theological school. Often, some of the same faculty

teach in both institutions, though the advanced degrees may not be listed at the theological school. In the theological and religious disciplines, completion of a master's degree is preferred before applying to doctoral programs, though this may not be required in every program.

Choosing a Theological School

As you begin to decide about applying to particular schools, there are a number of things to consider. While you may have a good idea about what you're looking for in a graduate theological school, you will quickly find that you have more options than you realized. If you are looking for a particular theological perspective, a specific emphasis or a general geographic region, you'll probably find more than one option that could satisfy your interests. The following considerations will help you as you begin your search, narrow your options and decide which schools will ultimately receive your application.

Denominational Requirements

As the needs and capacities of congregations change, denominations are stretching their own thinking about what kind of ministers churches need, and what kind of preparation ministry requires. Most denominations currently offer more than one avenue for certification in pastoral leadership. If you are interested in an alternative path towards preparation and credentialing, we encourage you to contact your denomination directly. We assume that most users of The FTE Guide are college graduates investigating education towards a Master of Divinity degree and ordination.

First and foremost, if you are considering graduate theological education as a path to ordination or a form of sanctioned ministry in a denomination or particular tradition, you must familiarize yourself with the requirements of that tradition. Some denominations require their ministers to complete part or all of their ministerial programs in a denominational or diocesan institution. Others maintain a list of schools outside the religious tradition that are acceptable for ministry preparation. If this is the case in your situation, your options may be prescribed for you, narrowing your choices considerably.

Accreditation

Educational accreditation is a rigorous process by which an institution is evaluated by an external organization for educational quality and effectiveness. For graduate theological education, the Commission on Accrediting of the Association of Theological Schools (ATS) serves as this accrediting agency. To be accredited, a school must undergo an initial review that examines a wide variety of factors, including library holdings, faculty quality and financial stability. The ATS Commissioners repeat this process on a regular basis to make sure each of its schools is maintaining an acceptable level of academic quality. Take note that while all the degrees in most schools are approved, schools can offer new degrees that are not yet approved by the ATS. (All the institutions listed in this resource are fully accredited or involved in the initial accreditation process.)

Accreditation provides a baseline of quality for theological degrees, ensuring that they will be uniformly accepted and recognized. In your search for schools, you may come across non-accredited theological schools. While these schools can serve an important role, remember that their quality can vary greatly since they are not being tracked by an independent assessment process.

Seminary, Divinity School, and School of Theology

In beginning your search for a theological school, the first thing you will notice is that these institutions have different titles, such as "seminary," "divinity school" or "school of theology." In addition to these three names, theological schools are also called "schools of religion," "theological institutes," "theological consortiums" and something similar. Is there any significance to the different names?

Well, yes and no. They all have commitments to forming ministers (defined broadly) for church and society, but they are organized in different ways that have an impact on their students.

Divinity schools are almost always related to an established university and act as one academic unit among others (such as business, education, law and humanities.) Students at divinity schools usually have access to the broad resources of the larger university, including a full range of library holdings, faculty/courses in other fields, and facilities and services associated with the larger institution. Generally speaking, university-related divinity schools offer students a broad base of resources beyond the theological disciplines. Students with interests in areas such as music, education, international studies or joint degrees should take a look at these types of schools.

Seminaries are usually freestanding institutions related to a particular denomination but entirely independent of a college or university. This environment can be powerful for a student's faith formation. Many, if not most, seminaries provide a strong sense of community, often centered on a residential community that lives, eats and worships together. While these schools may maintain cross-registration agreements with other institutions, the resources available to students are held internally and are usually centered exclusively on the theological disciplines. Generally, these institutions are particularly focused on the formation and preparation of ministers who will be ordained to serve congregations, as well as counselors, missionaries and other vocations closely related to traditional congregational ministry. Students typically do not have to be a member of the related denomination to attend.

Schools of theology or religion represent a third category of theological schools. However, beyond the two categories above, the nomenclature for theological schools begins to fragment significantly. For example, some schools of theology and religion are closely related to universities while others are free-standing, like seminaries. Others maintain relationships with other educational institutions or communities without maintaining official ties. Still others operate in theological consortia, where a number of schools from different traditions come together to offer a unique breadth of opportunities for students.

As a prospective student trying to choose among these different institutions, you should be most interested in the resources available to students, regardless of the name or organization of the school. Does the school offer everything you want and—more importantly—everything you might want in the coming years? Which type of institution can best serve your interests and calling? Where can you get the most flexibility as you grow into your vocation in these schools? Does the school seem to be the best fit for preparing you in what you feel called to do? All of these questions should be part of your evaluation as you consider the type of school to attend.

Mission Statements and Statements of Faith

After you decipher the organizational differences among institutions, you can learn a lot about a theological school from its mission statement. Schools can spend months—even years—crafting a carefully worded statement about the mission and goals of the institution.

You will notice that some schools also have lengthy statements of faith that detail specific theological points in order to carefully define their confessional stance. Other schools purposefully do not maintain an explicit statement of faith as a means to encourage the exploration of a wide range of theological reflection and construction. In considering a theological school, it is not essential that you fully agree with all aspects of the institution's statement of faith (if it has one). Rather, it is important to discern whether you can grow and be formed within the school's community of faith and formation.

Setting and Location

The geographic setting of an institution can greatly influence how the school approaches ministry, the academic specialties it offers and how the school interacts with its surrounding communities.

For instance, a school set in a large metropolitan area may have close relationships with congregations and organizations that meet social needs commonly found in an urban context (such as multiculturalism and homelessness). An urban theological school may be more fast-paced and diverse, like the city itself. Likewise, schools in smaller towns will naturally be influenced by the needs of their particular communities and by those who live and work in rural or suburban areas. Generally speaking, the community and culture of a theological school will be influenced by the school's immediate socio-cultural context.

When searching for theological schools, you might begin close to home, seeking schools in your immediate geographic area. Maybe you have close ties to family or a congregation that you are hesitant to leave. Perhaps your local minister is encouraging you to attend a particular school in the area, possibly his or her alma mater. While it may be easy to default to nearby schools, other institutions further away— even across the nation—may very well offer programs that are better suited to your interests or calling, and they may offer better financial aid. More importantly, changing your surroundings could prove to be a critical aspect of your formation as a student, minister, teacher and person of faith. When looking for schools, don't unnecessarily limit your options to your geographic comfort zone.

Student Body

Theological education happens in community, so it is important to make yourself aware of the gifts and the challenges of the student body at each school you are considering.

First, the size of a school's student body is important. Theological schools range from very small—ten to twenty students—to large complex institutions with thousands of students. Just like comparing small liberal arts colleges to large public universities, you can discover significant differences among theological schools based on the size of their student bodies. Average class sizes and access to faculty and institutional resources are usually directly affected by the number of students enrolled at a school.

You will also find that theological schools are not all residential. In such a school, a majority of students do not live on or immediately around the campus. Whether a school is located in a big city or small town, it may have more students living off-campus than those living on-campus. Why is this an important consideration? You may be looking for a theological immersion experience, living and working with a core group of people with similar interests and commitments. If you choose a school with a large commuter population, however, you may find that your core community is smaller and different from what you expected.

When looking at theological schools, you may assume that most students will be like you in age and stage of life. However, across the U.S. and Canada, student bodies of theological schools are becoming more and more diverse in nearly every way. Theological schools attract a cross-section of society, including more students who have just graduated from college than in recent years, increasing numbers of international students and a substantial contingent of older, second-career students.

Across all ATS-accredited theological schools during 2005, 40 percent of students are under the age of 30, 23 percent are between age 30 and 39, 18 percent are 40 to 49 years old, and 12 percent are over 50. In the classroom, this means students can benefit from a broader diversity of academic and professional experience as well as intergenerational perspectives that can significantly impact theological reflection and construction.

In your search, you will also note that schools vary greatly in the racial/ethnic makeup of their student bodies. While on the whole, theological education is attracting a more diverse student body, many schools are not ethnically diverse. This is something you will want to explore as you choose a school.

Faculty

It is also important to take a close look at the faculty at a theological school. Though it takes some doing, you can learn much about a school through the character of its faculty.

First, look at the distribution of the faculty among the theological disciplines. In part, the faculty make-up reflects the academic priorities of the school. For example, you may notice that a school has three faculty members in theology but only one in religious education. This might signal that the institution places more emphasis on the classical disciplines than on practical preparation. While this is not always accurate, it is a good start for determining the academic commitments of the school.

Next, look at the denominational or religious traditions of the faculty as well as the institutions in which they were trained. A religiously homogeneous faculty, educated in the same institutions, may present a more unified theology, while a more religiously and academically diverse faculty will likely introduce a wider variety of theological commitments and assumptions. Again, you must decide which approach is more important and attractive to you.

If you have the luxury of a campus visit, consider meeting with one or two faculty members. This is an excellent way to experience the way faculty relate to students. Is the experience collegial? Is it more transactional or businesslike? While you should not make broad generalizations about an entire faculty based on one experience, you can get a glimpse into what is generally expected from faculty when they meet with students. If the admissions office cannot find a faculty member to meet with you, consider what this may mean about the general accessibility of the faculty once you're a student.

Facilities

Finally, a student's experience can be impacted by the theological school's facilities. During a campus visit, pay attention to the classrooms, libraries, student housing (if any) and grounds and ask yourself whether they help foster the educational experience you expect. You may want to ask the admissions officer whether this is the school's normal appearance. If the buildings and grounds are ill-kept or in disrepair, you may have questions about whether this represents a lack of attention to other matters that support student learning. A good theological education can indeed occur in modest facilities, but your surroundings are worth investigating.

You will also want to learn about the technological offerings of the school. If you were born in the 1980s, you probably have been educated in an increasingly technological environment. From the library to the classroom to the residence halls, you may expect high-speed or wireless Internet access, paperless registration and billing, online journals and electronic texts from the library, or classroom technologies with professors who know how to use them. Many theological schools, however, do not have the financial resources to be as technologically advanced as most undergraduate colleges and universities. You will want to go into your educational experience fully apprised of the school's technological capabilities so you can prepare appropriately.

Tuition and Financial Aid

It is likely that you will not be able to pay for your entire theological education on your own. On face value, graduate theological education can represent a significant financial commitment for you and/or your family. But like everything else about these institutions, tuition and financial assistance can vary greatly from school to school. In many Catholic schools, tuition for future priests is partially or completely covered by the diocese supporting the students. Similarly, a few denominational schools charge lower tuitions for students from their traditions. Other schools offer full scholarships to students because of academic and vocational

promise. Unfortunately, most theological schools do not have the financial ability to offer significant tuition assistance to their students, leaving students with the primary responsibility for financing their education.

The good news is that theological schools are generally a “good bargain” in relation to other forms of professional education. According to ATS, the 2005-06 median tuition for theological schools in the U.S. was \$10,180 for master’s-level programs and \$5,532 in Canada. Compare this to graduate programs in business, engineering, medicine and law and you will quickly realize that a theological education is well-priced in the educational marketplace.

Even so, the Auburn Center for the Study of Theological Education reports that among 2001 graduates, only 37% had no debt and 33% had borrowed \$20,000 or more. [“The Gathering Storm,” www.auburnsem.org.] Like students in other professional schools, theology students do qualify for federally-insured education loans. While the total indebtedness for seminary graduates is decidedly lower than debts from other professional schools, theological graduates usually earn less upon graduation, thereby making debt loads a significant consideration in the decision-making process.

Institutional Aid

When investigating theological schools, make sure you fully understand all the financial aid options they offer. Do not rely solely on printed materials or Web sites, as these can be out of date. Be in personal contact with the admissions office, both to ask about the options the institution offers as well as to guide you to external scholarships of which they are aware. While most schools keep a rolling deadline for the admissions process, the financial aid decisions are usually made early, and the larger awards usually go to those who apply by the first application deadline, which may be as early as February 1. Most need-based grants are based on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), and institutions usually require a supplemental financial aid form for institutional assistance. If you pay close attention to the details (and make the financial aid director your best friend!) you will be ahead of the game in paying for your education.

External Aid

Finding external scholarships and grants to supplement your institutional aid, though often tedious, can be an important part of funding your education. There are a few places that every future theological student should explore.

First and foremost, if you are considering formal ministry in a denomination or particular tradition, check for scholarship resources at the national and regional level of that organization. Many denominations or traditions offer some sort of competitive scholarship opportunities for students from their communities. Sometimes, these are focused on students of particular heritage or with specific interests, but they all support the mission and values of that denomination.

Outside of your tradition, you will find numerous scholarships for students studying religion and the humanities in general. Other scholarships focus on how students want to use their degree, such as in ministry or service to society. Numerous online search resources are available, including popular sites like www.finaid.org and www.fastweb.com that allow you to establish a profile and search through thousands of scholarship sources for possible profile matches. These sites also offer good information on popular scholarship scams. (“If you have to pay money to get money,” they warn, “it’s probably a scam.”) Financial aid offices also may have a list of local or regional scholarships for which you may apply.

The Fund for Theological Education maintains an online directory of scholarships and fellowships at www.thefund.org/fundfinder.

FTE Fellowships for M.Div. Students

The Fund for Theological Education (FTE) offers two programs for Master of Divinity students 35 years of age or younger.

For entering students, the FTE Congregational Fellowship is a \$2,000 to \$5,000 award for tuition and living expenses that matches, dollar-for-dollar, the financial contribution made by a congregation toward the cost of a student's first year in seminary. Each Fellow also attends the FTE Conference on Excellence in Ministry in the summer prior to the fellowship year. At this annual gathering Congregational Fellows meet with distinguished theologians, pastors, church leaders and other FTE Fellows for several days of thoughtful exchange, including lectures, worship, forums, workshops and informal time together. The conference fosters mentoring relationships between students, theological leaders and pastors as they explore questions of ministry, service and the nature of Christian vocation. To be considered for the Congregational Fellowship, a student must be nominated by the supporting congregation.

For second-year students, the FTE Ministry Fellowship is a \$10,000 award to use for tuition and living expenses and to fund a self-designed ministry project. The significant financial and mentoring support provided by this fellowship is intended to enhance the student's preparation for ministerial leadership and to contribute to the vitality and longevity of the Fellow's service to the church. The program encourages initiative, creativity and independent learning opportunities not routinely included in the seminary curriculum. During the summer prior to the fellowship year, Ministry Fellows participate in a Congregational Leadership Intensive, meeting with FTE staff, pastors, leadership and financial planning consultants to focus on understanding themselves as congregational leaders and to learn key concepts and practices of excellent leadership. Immediately following the leadership intensive, Fellows attend the FTE Conference on Excellence in Ministry. The fellowship year concludes with the FTE Ministry Fellows convening again to share what they have learned from their completed ministry projects. Applicants for the Ministry Fellowship must first be nominated by the dean or president of their seminary.

In addition to its programs for seminary students, FTE offers the Undergraduate Fellowship for gifted, self-aware and imaginative college students considering going into the ministry. The fellowship provides a \$2,000 stipend for educational expenses and a network of support throughout the academic year. As part of the fellowship award, Undergraduate Fellows join other FTE Fellows at the Conference on Excellence in Ministry. For many of these undergraduates, the experience at the summer conference provides a first-time opportunity to learn about theological education and ministry with peers who share their interests and questions. Undergraduate Fellows are selected from a pool of applicants who have first been nominated by college faculty, administrators, campus ministers or current pastors.

Moving Ahead

As you explore and apply for theological schools, you most certainly will have questions about the process and experience of theological education. Consult your religious and educational mentors for advice and counsel about this decision. Be thorough in conversations with the admissions officers at the schools you'll be investigating. This is an important decision for your life and work in the world, so ask all your questions and make sure you are well-informed.

Most importantly, listen to your calling. FTE Fellow and theologian Frederick Buechner has famously written that vocation is "the place where your deep gladness meets the world's deep need." Preparing for God's work in the world means honoring your gifts and passions, identifying the needs of the world and pursuing the adventure of theological education.

HOW TO USE THE GUIDE

The FTE Guide is comprised of informational listings of the 254 institutions of the Association of Theological Schools (ATS). Each school is listed as ACCRED (fully accredited member of ATS), ASSOC (associate member) or CAND (candidate for membership).

Each ATS member institution provides annual demographic information about their institution; these data for 2005–06 were used to create a basic listing for each school. Some schools chose to expand their listings for a nominal fee to FTE (which has been put toward the publication of this resource); these schools are listed in a first section, in alphabetical order, followed by a second section of basic listings. Please note that the enrollment figures provided by the ATS combine full-time and part-time enrollments. All data in all listings should be treated as informational only; individual institutions should be contacted for accurate and updated reports on the data referenced herein.

As noted, some mission statements submitted by the schools have been shortened because of space limitations. Please consult materials from these schools for complete mission statements.

In some cases, schools with extended listings have not provided certain information solicited by the FTE Guide's standard protocol. Users should be aware that some institutions do not collect, sort or analyze data in the categories used in the FTE Guide and therefore, a school may not have the requested information available to provide or it may not be applicable. These instances are marked "n/a".

Tuition rates and financial aid apportionments are highly variable among theological schools. All tuition and financial aid figures listed are for the M.Div. degree. Other master's-level and advanced doctoral degrees may require higher tuition and offer different levels of financial aid. Again, contact the individual school for accurate and updated data.

If an institution does not require field education requirements to be completed in a parish, other options often include hospitals, nursing homes, prisons, church-related social service agencies and other church-related organizations directly involved with ministry.

All financial information for Canadian schools is listed in Canadian dollars. Non-Canadian citizens may be required to pay a different tuition as international students.

Schools that allow cross-registration usually have agreements with other colleges, universities and/or theological schools in their region through which students can take classes.

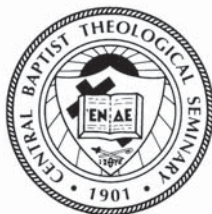

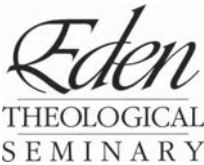
